**MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE BOARD OF RUTHERFORD COUNTY COMMISSIONERS  
HELD AT THE LAKE LURE MUNICIPAL CENTER, LAKE LURE, NORTH CAROLINA ON  
OCTOBER 7, 2013 AT 6:00 P.M.**

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**CALL TO ORDER/PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE**

Chairman Owens called the meeting of the Rutherford County Board of Commissioners to order. Commissioner Lovelace led in the Pledge of Allegiance.

**AGENDA APPROVAL**

Commissioner Lovelace moved that the agenda for the October 7, 2013 County Commissioners' meeting be approved. Vice Chairman Eckler seconded the motion. The motion passed with Commissioners Owens, Eckler, Holland, Lovelace, and Richard voting aye; no Commissioner voting no; no Commissioners excused; and no Commissioners absent.

**PUBLIC COMMENTS**

Ms. Amy Drum asked that the Board reconsider a decision to relocate the Haynes Library to Cliffside. The library had been located in Cliffside originally, but had been moved to Henrietta when the Haynes Memorial Building which had housed the library had been demolished. Ms. Drum had offered a building which she owns in Cliffside as a home for the library, but the offer had been declined. She asked that the Commissioners allow the library to return to its original home in Cliffside.

Mr. Boyce Abernathy discussed transparency in Rutherford County government. He asked that he be placed on the November County Commissioners agenda to discuss the need for a yearly and monthly report to the citizens telling them of the profit or loss for the Rutherford County Airport, the Emergency Medical Services, and the Solid Waste Department.

Commissioner Richard asked that Mr. Abernathy be placed on the November County Commissioners' agenda.

Mr. Aaron Vassey spoke to the Board regarding a petition that had been signed by a number of citizens supporting the naming of two separate bridges in Rutherford County in honor of Captain Roy Huskey and Sergeant Owen Messersmith who were employed with the Rutherford County Sheriff's Department and were killed in the line of duty on May 31, 1979. The signage of each bridge costs \$2,000. The North Carolina Department of Transportation will fund half of this amount. He asked that the additional funding of \$1,000 per bridge be funded by Rutherford County.

Ms. Betty Frye told the Board that there is a problem in Rutherford County in taking care of those suffering from mental illness. A place is needed for those who have stopped their medication that is safe and that would be available to them until a bed is available in a psychiatric hospital.

Families are not equipped to deal with this problem. She asked for an appointment with the County Manager.

Mr. Ken McAlear provided material to the Board regarding the national debt which he said is \$17 trillion. He appealed to everyone to write their Congressman asking that the national debt be paid. He also reiterated that the national debt ceiling should not be raised.

**APPLIED SCIENCES CENTER/COMMISSIONERS OWENS AND ECKLER**

Chairman Owens spoke about the role in education that had traditionally been called vocational education and is presently called applied sciences. This has become increasingly important due to high-tech manufacturing jobs and the specialized knowledge and skills required to design, operate, and maintain modern manufacturing equipment. Recent discussions at the State and local level have sought to find a cost-effective way to best train Rutherford County students to take advantage of these career opportunities and to educate skilled employees for current and future local manufacturers.

Vice Chairman Eckler moved to direct the County Manager to work with the School Superintendent and the President of Isothermal Community College to discuss, investigate, and report back to the County Commissioners on creating an Applied Sciences Center that will prepare Rutherford County students for trade and technical careers serving industry in Rutherford County and surrounding region. He further moved to direct and authorize the County Manager to apply for and execute grant funding to further the discussion and investigation of an Applied Sciences Center.

Commissioner Lovelace seconded the motion. The motion passed with Commissioners Owens, Eckler, Holland, Lovelace, and Richard voting aye; no Commissioner voting no; no Commissioners excused; and no Commissioners absent.

### **PROCLAMATION/BECHTLER GOLD DAY**

Ms. Michelle Yelton, representing the newly-developed Tourism Asset Foundation requested that the Board proclaim October 17 as "Bechtler Gold Day" in Rutherford County. This is part of a fund raising effort by the Foundation.

Commissioner Lovelace moved to approve the proclamation. Vice Chairman Eckler seconded the motion. The motion passed with Commissioners Owens, Eckler, Holland, Lovelace, and Richard voting aye; no Commissioner voting no; no Commissioners excused; and no Commissioners absent.

#### **Bechtler Gold Day in Rutherford County, N.C.**

**WHEREAS**, the Town of Rutherfordton in Rutherford County is home to Christopher Bechtler who minted America's first one-dollar gold coin in 1832 (17 years before the U.S. Mint) and increased Rutherford County's historic significance and gave it recognition on a national scale.

**WHEREAS**, Rutherford County is part of North Carolina's rich gold history that is attractive to tourists, students and residents.

**WHEREAS**, the Town of Rutherfordton's 225<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2012 resulted in the opening of The Bechtler House, currently privately owned, as a heritage center and also the renovation and opening of The Bechtler Mint Site.

**WHEREAS**, the American Numismatic Society agreed to loan the original Bechtler coin press to the Town of Rutherfordton to display in The Bechtler House Heritage Center on a renewable five-year loan.

**WHEREAS**, the 2012 premier of the UNC-TV documentary, "Gold Fever & the Bechtler Mint" attracted nearly 1, 000 attendees to Rutherfordton.

**WHEREAS**, other organizations in the county, such as Rutherford Town Revitalization, have produced gold coin replicas to sell as souvenirs due to growing interest and pride in our County's Bechtler legacy.

**NOW, THEREFORE**, I, Julius Owens, Chairman of the Rutherford County Board of Commissioners, on behalf of the Rutherford County Commissioners, do hereby proclaim October 17 as "Bechtler Gold Day" in Rutherford County, North Carolina, and call upon Rutherford County residents to celebrate, participate and promote heritage and culture in our community.

**PROCLAIMED** this 7<sup>th</sup> day of October, 2013.

### **CAPTAIN ROY HUSKEY AND SERGEANT OWEN MESSERSMITH/MEMORIAL BRIDGES**

The Board had received a request to name two bridges in Rutherford County in honor of Captain Roy Huskey and Captain Owen Messersmith who were employees of the Rutherford County Sheriff's Department and killed in the line of duty on May 31, 1979. Three law enforcement officers

were killed on that day, but a bridge was previously named in honor of North Carolina Trooper Pete Peterson. A resolution required by NCDOT for the renaming of bridges was included with the information provided to the Board.

If the resolution is approved by the Board and the NCDOT, the signage for each bridge is \$2,000 per bridge. Half of the \$2,000 would be paid by the state. It was requested that the Board of Commissioners pay the additional \$1,000 per sign.

Commissioner Richard moved to approve the resolution and the budget amendment approving the county's contribution. Vice Chairman Eckler seconded the motion. The motion passed with Commissioners Owens, Eckler, Holland, Lovelace, and Richard voting aye; no Commissioner voting no; no Commissioners excused; and no Commissioners absent.

**Resolution Requesting that the North Carolina Department of Transportation Dedicate and Name Bridge 2169 on US Hwy 74 Bypass in Honor of Captain Roy Huskey and Bridge 2213 on US Hwy 74 in Honor of Sgt. Owen Messersmith**

**WHEREAS**, Captain Roy Huskey had served in the Rutherford County Sheriff's Office for 12 year in 1979; and

WHEREAS, Sgt. Owen Messersmith had served in the Rutherford County Sheriff's Office for 4-1/2 years in 1979; and

**WHEREAS**, On May 31, 1979, Captain Roy Huskey and Sgt. Owen Messersmith answered a domestic disturbance call; and

**WHEREAS**, during the course of performing their duties in response to this call, these two brave men lost their lives; and

**WHEREAS**, in a profession where death is always present, these two officers reported for work on May 31, 1979, but never returned home; and

**WHEREAS**, Captain Roy Huskey and Sgt. Owen Messersmith gave their lives to protect the citizens of Rutherford County.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Rutherford County Board of Commissioners hereby recommend honoring Captain Roy Huskey by requesting that the North Carolina Department of Transportation dedicate and name Bridge 2169 which is on US 74 Bypass in Rutherford County, North Carolina in honor of Captain Roy Huskey..

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ALSO RESOLVED** that the Rutherford County Board of Commissioners hereby recommend honoring Sgt. Owen Messersmith by requesting that the North Carolina Department of Transportation dedicate and name Bridge 2213 which is on US 74 in Rutherford County, North Carolina in honor of Sgt. Owen Messersmith.

**Adopted this the 7th day of October, 2012.**

<b>RECORDS RETENTION SCHEDULE</b>
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The Department of Cultural Resources has added amendments to the Record Retention Schedules for the following departments: County Management, Revenue, and Register of Deeds. These had been submitted to the Commissioners for their approval in order to begin using these new

amendments along with their corresponding retention schedules.

Commissioner Lovelace moved to approve the records retention schedules for the County Manager, the Revenue Department, and the Register of Deeds. Vice Chairman Eckler seconded the motion. The motion passed with Commissioners Owens, Eckler, Holland, and Lovelace voting aye; Commissioner Richard voting no; no Commissioners excused; and no Commissioners absent.

<b>BUDGET AMENDMENTS</b>
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Isothermal Community College had submitted two equipment requests to be funded from their capital funds. To maintain their grounds, a lawnmower (approximately \$5,000) and a tractor and bush hog (\$28,192.93) are needed. Total budget is \$33,200.

Also, a narrative was included in the agenda explaining how the County will be handling financing for tax foreclosures. The Rutherford County Finance Office will be using a similar process for all foreclosure proceedings, including those at Queens Gap and Grey Rock, mortgage style and in rem foreclosures. To process documentation and record the deed in the name of Rutherford County, the Finance Office will need to prepare checks to the Clerk's Office, Revenue Department and the Register of Deeds or to the Attorney's Trust Account for the disbursements to be made. A copy of the documentation will be stored in the Finance Office.

The transaction does not require a budget amendment because when complete, Rutherford County will have the majority of the funds back (through the payment of ad valorem taxes) and will have the asset (land) on the books as Held for Sale — In Rem Property, Held for Sale—Queens Gap Property, Held for Sale-Grey Rock Property and Held for Sale — Mortgage Style Foreclosure Property. Due to the number of transactions anticipated to be completed in the upcoming months, the Finance Office asked to document the procedure and inform the Commissioners of how they will be handled. Budget amendments will not be needed except for legal fees.

Rutherford County Schools is applying for a School Resource Officer Matching Grant from the Department of Public Instruction which is due October 11, 2013. The Sheriff's Office and the School Board are working closely to complete the application in the next few days. Through the grant, a new position would be funded and an existing Sheriff's Office position would be used as the matching funds. No additional funding from the County would be needed, if awarded. A budget amendment will be submitted once the School Board receives notification of an award

Vice Chairman Eckler moved to approve the budget amendments. Commissioner Holland seconded the motion. The motion passed with Commissioners Owens, Eckler, Holland, and Lovelace voting aye; Commissioner Richard voting no; no Commissioners excused; and no Commissioners absent

**SPECIAL PRESENTATION - NCACC VIDEO**

A short video was shown that was prepared by the North Carolina Association of County Commissioners. The video included an introduction from NCACC President Ray Jeffers and featured NCACC staff updating Commissioners on Steering Committees and how Commissioners can participate. Also included was an overview of an upcoming seminar on the Affordable Care Act and how it affects counties, as well as, the Association's Risk Management Services

**VEHICLE TAX APPEAL**

The Revenue Department had received an appeal for a registered motor vehicle tax bill. The owner had filed the appeal in a timely manner, and it must be heard by the Board of Commissioners.

The Revenue Department recommended denying the request as it has been determined that the value placed on the vehicle by the Revenue Department is the fair market value of the vehicle as of January 1, 2013 which is the required appraisal date.

Commissioner Lovelace made a motion to deny the appeal. Vice Chairman Eckler seconded the motion. The motion passed with Commissioners Owens, Eckler, Lovelace, and Richard voting aye; Commissioner Holland not voting; no Commissioner voting no; no Commissioners excused; and no Commissioners absent.

**WATER/SEWER INFRASTRUCTURE DEVELOPMENT**

At its 2013 Goals Setting Workshop, the Board of Commissioners made expansion of infrastructure one of its highest priorities. Responses to this goal included funding for the water line to the Airport and completion of pending water and sewer grants. Article VI of Appendix A, Rutherford County Code, calls for “a portion of the one cent sales tax” to be allocated to a water and sewer infrastructure program but, due to budget constraints, this allocation was ended with the FY2011-12 budget ordinance.

The financial constraints facing the County in preparing the FY2011-12 budget are no less today and even more challenging in many ways. Further, the 12-13 General Assembly removed the water and sewer grant/loan-making authority from the Rural Center, Golden Leaf, Clean Water Management Trust Fund and SRF and placed all of those functions under a new entity within DENR referred to as the Rural Infrastructure Authority. The new Authority is supposed to begin operation in January 2014 but its rules and priorities have not yet been established.

Given the changes at the State level and the budget constraints at the local level, funding for water and sewer line expansion is difficult. The County Manager has been discussing an idea among staff and utility providers that would use the framework of the existing Code but would be funded more on a “pay as you go” model. The model would call for the County to pay 50% or more of a project but 50% of all revenues (not just tap fees) would go towards payment back to the County. Payback should occur within a 10-year period, except in extraordinary cases. All projects would need approval by the governing board of the water and sewer provider and by the County Commissioners. Funds could be used to match State and federal grants so long as the utility provider has provided not less than 10% of the cost of the project in cash or other borrowing (not grant, in-kind, or otherwise).

Capitalization of the water/sewer program would come from a set-aside of County reserves. Applications would be due in the winter/spring, reviewed by a technical committee, and presented to the Board of Commissioners during the budget process. Water and sewer projects that would be part of a County economic development agreement or other economic development incentive would not be subject to the budget process time frame.

Manager Classen said he would review with water/sewer providers the aforementioned and request their input. He would report back to the County Commissioners for further review.

**QUEEN’S GAP PROJECT 1/BID**

A bid tab and ranking for Queen’s Gap Project 1 had been provided to the Board for their consideration. Mr. David Odom of Odom Engineering recommended awarding the contract to the low bidder which was Clary Hood, Inc. in the amount of \$897,560.40.

Manager Classen said the low bid is slightly over budget; however, the largest two stream

crossings are included in this project.

Commissioner Richard moved to approve the low bid from Clary Hood, Inc. Vice Chairman Eckler seconded the motion. The motion passed with Commissioners Owens, Eckler, Holland, Lovelace, and Richard voting aye; no Commissioner voting no; no Commissioners excused; and no Commissioners absent.

#### **GREY ROCK DEVELOPMENT PROJECT 4 PAVING**

The bid tab and ranking for Grey Rock Development Project 4 Paving had been provided to the Board for their consideration. Mr. David Odom of Odom Engineering recommended that the contract be awarded to the lower bid by Harrison Construction Company in the amount of \$175,778.46.

Commissioner Holland made a motion to approve the low bid. Vice Chairman Eckler seconded the motion. The motion passed with Commissioners Owens, Eckler, Holland, Lovelace, and Richard voting aye; no Commissioner voting no; no Commissioners excused; and no Commissioners absent.

#### **SOLID WASTE CODE REVIEW**

Following the FY 2013-2014 budget discussions and beginning in the summer, staff from the Solid Waste, Revenue, and Finance Departments have been meeting to review solid waste convenience site fee collections. Their discussions and review have led to corresponding discussions about solid waste enforcement, solid waste hauling, and a general review of the existing County Code relating to Solid Waste (Chapter 25). The Solid Waste chapter has not been substantially updated since the 1990's and, over time, practices have been altered so the Code language and practices and current practices are not consistent with one another. Staff will be reviewing the Solid Waste chapter and making recommendations to the Commissioners.

#### **RECYCLING/ENHANCED RECYCLING AND ELECTRONICS RECYCLING**

Solid Waste Director James Kilgo provided an update to the Board on Enhanced Recycling and Electronics Recycling. The Enhanced Recycling began on September 24. The recyclable products are transported to Benfields in Mooresville. Electronics have been wrapped and are waiting for pick up. Mr. Kilgo stated that he believes the County has a good handle on the electronics recycling at this point.

#### **DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL SERVICES/NC FAST**

Social Services' Director John Carroll provided an update to the Board on NC Fast which is new software being utilized by the Departments of Social Services across the state. A soft launch

began about a year ago. There have been glitches, but due to the foresight of staff at Rutherford County's Department of Social Services, these have not been major. NC Fast has proven to be very valuable in the Food and Nutrition Program. The soft launch of Medicaid and Work First began on October 1.

**FEDERAL SHUTDOWN**

County Manager Classen addressed County programs that are impacted by the federal shutdown. The county will continue to fund the Child Care Subsidy and other programs where funds are available with the hopes that Washington will reach a resolution shortly. If necessary, budgets can be amended later in the year. There is a working group that is addressing this issue and will continue to monitor and report on developments.

**REVENUE DEPARTMENT/UPDATE**

County Manager Carl Classen gave the Board an update on the progress of the Revenue Department Project. The project is on time and under budget. A problem has arisen regarding the data migration, but the county is spending a lot of time and effort to make sure this works correctly.

Commissioner Richard asked if the County was continuing to do discovery notices. When Manager Classen replied affirmatively, Commissioner Richard asked for a list of the notices.

Manager Classen said he was aware that some citizens had questions about the coefficient of dispersion. Mr. Emmett Curl had agreed to conduct a public workshop and answer questions.

Public Works and Planning Director Danny Searcy called the Board's attention to Draft 4 of the Solar Energy Development Ordinance and a definition change in this draft. A solar farm is defined as *"a utility-scale, commercial solar energy system, the full size of which solar energy system is six (6) acres or more."*

Vice Chairman Eckler moved to remove 100.08 d from the ordinance. (*100.08 d – Fencing shall not encroach into the setbacks.*) Commissioner Lovelace seconded the motion. The motion passed with Commissioners Eckler, Holland, Lovelace, and Richard voting aye; no Commissioner voting no; Commissioner Owens excused; and no Commissioners absent.

Commissioner Richard made a motion to make several additional changes to the ordinance which included striking 100.08 b and adding wording to 100.08 a. The motion died for lack of a second.

Commissioner Lovelace moved to approve Draft 4 of the Solar Energy Development Ordinance as amended. Commissioner Holland seconded the motion. The motion passed with Commissioners Eckler, Holland, and Lovelace voting aye; Commissioner Richard voting no; Commissioner Owens excused; and no Commissioners absent

## **RUTHERFORD COUNTY ORDINANCE FOR SOLAR ENERGY DEVELOPMENT**

### **100.01 - TITLE**

This Ordinance shall be known as the "Rutherford County Ordinance for Solar Energy Development"

### **100.02 - PURPOSE**

The purpose of this ordinance is to protect public health and safety through establishing reasonable standards for the construction, installation, and operation of commercial energy systems (*solar farms*) in Rutherford County. This ordinance is not intended to abridge safety, health, or environmental requirements contained in other applicable codes, standards, or ordinances.

### **100.03 - AUTHORITY**

This Ordinance is adopted pursuant to the authority and provisions of North Carolina General Statutes Chapter 153A-121.

### **100.04 - JURISDICTION**

This Ordinance shall apply to all unincorporated areas of Rutherford County which are not included in the extraterritorial jurisdiction of any municipality. All municipalities and their respective corporate limits shall be exempted from the Ordinance, unless they choose to adopt this Ordinance or some form thereof.

### **100.05 - DEFINITIONS**

**Solar Energy System** – the components and subsystems required to convert solar energy into electric or thermal energy, including all equipment and accessory buildings.

**Solar farm** – a utility-scale, commercial solar energy system, the full size of which solar energy system is six (6) acres or more.

#### 100.06 - APPLICABILITY

- a. "Solar Farm" shall not include non-commercial solar energy systems.
- b. This ordinance applies to the construction of solar farms in the jurisdiction of unincorporated Rutherford County.
- c. Solar farms established with appropriate building/electrical Permit from Rutherford County prior to the effective date of this ordinance shall be exempt.
- d. This ordinance shall not be deemed to supercede any other provisions of local, state, or federal law.

#### 100.07 - PERMITS / REQUIREMENTS

- a. A building/electrical permit and compliance with this ordinance is required for all solar farms.
- b. An engineered site plan demonstrating compliance with this ordinance shall be submitted to the Building Inspector for review and approval of the site plan shall occur prior to issuing the building/electrical permit.
- c. Upon completion of site construction a certified as-built by the engineer shall be submitted to the Building Inspector and filed with the Register of Deeds. This as-built plan shall receive approval by the permitting staff prior to final inspection and prior to issuing the Certificate of Occupancy and/or the notice to proceed to the Utility provider,
- d. Solar panel materials shall comply with UL 1703 or as hereafter amended. Documentation of compliance shall be provided with the seal and signature of a design professional licensed in North Carolina.

#### 100.08 SETBACKS / SCREENING

- a. A minimum setback distance of 50' from all property boundaries shall be required.  
**Exception:** Property boundaries of adjoining parcels which are part of a single solar farm project as shown on the site plan shall not be subject to this setback requirement. A written waiver signed by the property owner(s) shall be required.
- b. Power inverters and other sound producing equipment shall be no less than 150' from any dwelling unit at the time of construction/installation.
- c. All solar energy systems shall be completely enclosed with a minimum of six (6) feet high chain link or security fencing as measured from the natural grade of the fencing perimeter.
- d. Solar farms shall be constructed with evergreen vegetative screening where existing buffers do not obscure solar energy system perimeters from dwelling units on adjacent parcels. At maturity required vegetative screening shall be not less than fifteen (15) feet tall, regardless of line-of-sight.

#### 100.09 HEIGHT LIMITATIONS

The height of solar energy system solar panels shall be measured from the highest natural grade below each solar panel to the top of that panel. Panel height shall not exceed 15 feet.

Poles and wires necessary to connect to public electric utility shall not be subject to this requirement.

**100.10 DECOMMISSIONING**

A Decommissioning Plan shall be submitted to the building inspector as part of the permit approval process and recorded with the Register of Deeds. The Decommissioning Plan shall include the following provisions and requirements:

1. Defined conditions upon which decommissioning will be initiated (i.e., end of lease, condition of a potential public safety hazard, etc.)
2. Removal of all non-utility owned equipment conduits, structures, fencing, roads, and foundations; and restoration of property to condition prior to development of the solar farm.  
A written waiver signed by the property owner is required in order to release any portion of this provision.
3. The timeframe for completion of removal and decommissioning activities. Signed statement from the party responsible for completing the Decommissioning Plan acknowledging such responsibility. Upon failure to accomplish the Decommissioning Plan, the Building Inspector may take action as authorized in the County Code Chapter 3 Article 4, Unsafe Buildings.

**100.11 SEVERABILITY CLAUSE**

Should any section or provision of the Ordinance for Solar Energy Development be determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or invalid, such determination or decision shall not affect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole, or a part thereof, other than the part so declared to be unconstitutional or invalid.

**100.12 GRANDFATHER PROVISION**

Any solar farm not permitted by this Ordinance, which is in operation at the time of the adoption of this Ordinance is hereby exempted from the provisions of this ordinance.

Effective date: 1<sup>st</sup> day of November 2013.

#### **Section 5311 FY 2015 RESOLUTION**

**WHEREAS**, Article 2B of Chapter 136 of the North Carolina General Statutes and the Governor of North Carolina have designated the North Carolina Department of Transportation (NCDOT) as the agency responsible for administering federal and state public transportation funds; and

**WHEREAS**, the North Carolina Department of Transportation will apply for a grant from the US Department of Transportation, Federal Transit Administration and receives funds from the North Carolina General Assembly to provide assistance for rural public transportation projects; and

**WHEREAS**, the purpose of these transportation funds is to provide grant monies to local agencies for the provision of rural public transportation services consistent with the policy requirements for planning, community and agency involvement, service design, service alternatives, training and conference participation, reporting and other requirements (drug and alcohol testing policy and program, disadvantaged business enterprise program, and fully allocated costs analysis); and

**WHEREAS**, Rutherford County hereby assures and certifies that it will provide the required local matching funds; that its staff has the technical capacity to implement and manage the project, prepare required reports, obtain required training, attend meetings and conferences; and agrees to comply with the federal and state statutes, regulations, executive orders, Section 5333 (b) Warranty, and all administrative requirements related to the applications made to and grants received from the Federal Transit Administration, as well as the provisions of Section 1001 of Title 18, U. S. C.

**NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved** that the County Manager of Rutherford County Board of Commissioners is hereby authorized to submit a grant application for federal and state funding, make the necessary assurances and certifications and be empowered to enter into an agreement with the NCDOT to provide rural public transportation services.

He also requested that any reports be provided in paper copies at County Commissioners' meetings. County Manager Carl Classen asked that the Board allow sufficient time to prepare some reports for the Board's consideration.

Commissioner Richard's motion died for lack of a second.

### COMMISSIONER RICHARD/ANIMAL ISSUE

Ms. Lynn Cole spoke to the Board regarding dangerous dogs which had killed her family's pet. She said there is language in the Rutherford County Animal Control Ordinance that would address a portion of the problem, but it is not being enforced. Cleveland County's ordinance regarding this issue would be a good template for Rutherford County to consider, according to Ms. Cole.

Commissioner Richard made a motion to direct the County Manager to work with the Sheriff, the County Attorney, the District Attorney, and other appropriate personnel to draft appropriate language for any needed ordinance or policy changes and provide this to the Board. Vice Chairman Eckler seconded the motion. The motion passed with Commissioners Owens, Eckler, Holland, Lovelace, and Richard voting aye; no Commissioner voting no; no Commissioners excused; and no Commissioners absent.

### COMMISSIONER RICHARD/AIRPORT AUTHORITY/MEMBERSHIP

Commissioner Richard provided the following information to the County Manager with copies to the Board and the County Attorney, "*Section 2 of Session Law 2013-181, House Bill 290 and Session Laws 1971, Chapter 335 state the Airport Authority shall consist of 5 members. Upon occurrence of any vacancy, said vacancy shall be filled within 60 days after notice thereof at a regular meeting of the Board of Commissioners. My letter date of August 08, 2013 informs you, the other County Commissioners and County Attorney Richard Williams that I decline to serve as an Airport Authority member. The 60 days have now expired and the November 4, 2013 meeting would be the mandated meeting to fill said vacancy.*"

County Attorney Richard Williams said the Board of Commissioners made a decision at the August meeting to serve as the Airport Authority. As there is no vacancy on the Board of Commissioners, there is no vacancy on the Airport Authority.

Commissioner Richard said he could not be seated until he took the Oath of Office. Therefore, any Airport document listing his name would be a false document.

**AWARD/FINANCE OFFICE**

Chairman Owens presented a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting to the Rutherford County Finance Office and offered congratulations for achieving this highest form of recognition in government and financial reporting for the 24<sup>th</sup> consecutive year.

**RESOLUTION/SMOKY MOUNTAINS GOVERNANCE**

The North Carolina General Assembly recently adopted NCGS §122C-118.1 - Structure of area board. The statute states that “*An area board shall have no fewer than 11 and no more than 21 voting members.*” Because the newly consolidated Smokey Mountain Mental Health Authority is comprised of 23 member counties, the impact of this statute effectively prevents each county from having the ability to appoint a member to represent their county. A resolution was provided for the Board’s consideration that requested the General Assembly to amend the law, removing the limitation of twenty one (21) members.

Commissioner Lovelace moved to approve the resolution. Vice Chairman Eckler seconded the motion. The motion passed with Commissioners Owens, Eckler, Holland, Lovelace, and Richard voting aye; no Commissioner voting no; no Commissioners excused; and no Commissioners absent.

**RESOLUTION**

**WHEREAS**, NCGS 122C-118.1 Structure of area board - limits the membership of area mental health authority boards to twenty one voting members; and

**WHEREAS**, the newly consolidated Smokey Mountain Mental Health Authority is constituted of twenty three Western North Carolina counties; and

**WHEREAS**, NCGS 122C-118.1 effectively prevents each member county from appointing and being represented by an individual selected by the County Commissioners of each member county; and

**WHEREAS**, the need for the equitable and effective representation of all constituents served by the Smokey Mountain Mental Health Authority, as well as potentially other mental health authorities throughout the State in the near future is self evident;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Rutherford County Board of Commissioners respectfully requests that the North Carolina General Assembly amend the law to remove the limitation of twenty one members and replace that with language allowing each Board of County Commissioners to appoint a representative of their choosing.

**BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED** that a copy of this resolution shall be sent to Senator Hise and to Representative Hager.

**§ 20-187.2. Badges and service side arms of deceased or retiring members of State, city and county law-enforcement agencies; weapons of active members.**

(a) Surviving spouses, or in the event such members die unsurvived by a spouse, surviving children of members of North Carolina State, city and county law-enforcement agencies killed in the line of duty or who are members of such agencies at the time of their deaths, and retiring members of such agencies shall receive upon request and at no cost to them, the badge worn or carried by such deceased or retiring member. The governing body of a law-enforcement agency may, in its discretion, also award to a retiring member or surviving relatives as provided herein, upon request, the service side arm of such deceased or retiring members, at a price determined by such governing body, upon securing a permit as required by G.S. 14-402 et seq. or 14-409.1 et seq., or without such permit provided the weapon shall have been rendered incapable of being fired. Governing body shall mean for county and local alcohol beverage control officers, the county or local board of alcoholic control; for all other law-enforcement officers with jurisdiction limited to a municipality or town, the city or town council; for all other law-enforcement officers with countywide jurisdiction, the board of county commissioners; for all State law-enforcement officers, the head of the department.

(b) Active members of North Carolina State law-enforcement agencies, upon change of type of weapons, may purchase the weapon worn or carried by such member at a price which shall be the average yield to the State from the sale of similar weapons during the preceding year. (1971, c. 669; 1973, c. 1424; 1975, c. 44; 1977, c. 548; 1979, c. 882; 1987, c. 122.)

**§ 153A-40. Regular and special meetings.**

(a) The board of commissioners shall hold a regular meeting at least once a month, and may hold more frequent regular meetings. The board may by resolution fix the time and place of its regular meetings. If such a resolution is adopted, at least 10 days before the first meeting to which the resolution is to apply, the board shall cause a copy of it to be posted on the courthouse bulletin board and a summary of it to be published. If no such resolution is adopted, the board shall meet at the courthouse on the first Monday of each month, or on the next succeeding business day if the first Monday is a holiday.

If use of the courthouse or other designated regular meeting place is made temporarily impossible, inconvenient, or unwise, the board may change the time or place or both of a regular meeting or of all regular meetings within a specified period of time. The board shall cause notice of the temporary change to be posted at or near the regular meeting place and shall take any other action it considers helpful in informing the public of the temporary change.

The board may adjourn a regular meeting from day to day or to a day certain until the business before the board is completed.

(b) The chairman or a majority of the members of the board may at any time call a special meeting of the board of commissioners by signing a written notice stating the time and place of the meeting and the subjects to be considered. The person or persons calling the meeting shall cause the notice to be delivered to the chairman and each other member of the board or left at the usual dwelling place of each at least 48 hours before the meeting and shall cause a copy of the notice to be posted on the courthouse bulletin board at least 48 hours before the meeting. Only those items of business specified in the notice may be transacted at a special meeting, unless all members are present or those not present have signed a written waiver.

If a special meeting is called to deal with an emergency, the notice requirements of this subsection do not apply. However, the person or persons calling such a special meeting shall take reasonable action to inform the other members and the public of the meeting. Only business connected with the emergency may be discussed at a meeting called pursuant to this paragraph.

In addition to the procedures set out in this subsection, a person or persons calling a special or emergency meeting of the board of commissioners shall comply with the notice requirements of Article 33B of General Statutes Chapter 143.

(c) The board of commissioners shall hold all its meetings within the county except:

- (1) In connection with a joint meeting of two or more public bodies; provided, however, that such a meeting shall be held within the boundaries of the political subdivision represented by the members of one of the public bodies participating;
- (2) In connection with a retreat, forum, or similar gathering held solely for the purpose of providing members of the board with general information relating to the performance of their public duties; provided, however, that members of the board of commissioners shall not vote upon or otherwise transact public business while in attendance at such a gathering;
- (3) In connection with a meeting between the board of commissioners and its local legislative delegation during a session of the General Assembly; provided, however, that at any such meeting the members of the board of commissioners may not vote upon or otherwise transact public business except with regard to matters directly relating to legislation proposed to or pending before the General Assembly;
- (4) While in attendance at a convention, association meeting or similar gathering; provided, however, that any such meeting may be held solely to discuss or deliberate the board's position concerning convention resolutions, elections of association officers and similar issues that are not legally binding upon the board of commissioners or its constituents.

All meetings held outside the county shall be deemed "official meetings" within the meaning of G.S. 143-318.10(d). (Code, s. 706; Rev., s. 1317; C.S., s. 1296; 1945, c. 132; 1951, c. 904, s. 1; 1961, c. 154; 1967, c. 617, s. 1; 1969, c. 349, s. 1; c. 1036; 1973, c. 822, s. 1; 1977, 2nd Sess., c. 1191, s. 6; 1985, c. 745.)

## ***Executive Summary***

The exploration of the relocation and expansion of the Rutherford County Farmers Market is a joint partnership of Rutherford County, the Town of Forest City, and the NC Cooperative Extension Service-Rutherford Center. In August 2013, the Rutherford County Commissioners and the Town of Forest City Council passed a joint resolution in support of the concept and charged the administrations of the County, Town, and NC Cooperative Extension Service-Rutherford Center to conduct an in-house feasibility study and report back to the Boards within ninety (90) days.

In the ninety-day period, the staff accomplished the following:

- Formed a Steering Committee of growers and customers of the current Farmers Market;
- Conducted five focus groups and two special meetings with 125 participants;
- Conducted interviews and gained the support of seventeen local and regional potential partners, ranging from the local school system, hospital, and agricultural-related agencies to the regional *Advantage West* economic development organization;
- Developed a selection criteria for the relocation of the Farmers Market structure and researched all county-owned properties plus the Town-owned Florence Mill property;
- Narrowed the relocation search to six eligible properties that met the criteria to present to the Steering Committee;
- Assisted the Steering Committee in selecting the Florence Mill site for the Market relocation;
- Developed a concept for the use of the 15,000 SF Florence Mill 1922 Warehouse building entitled ***the Agricultural Innovations and Solutions Center*** which will include an indoor market, value-added processing center, and office and educational space;
- Worked with a private sector developer to determine the feasibility of using historic rehabilitation tax credits to fund the approximate \$2 million renovation cost for the 1922 Warehouse building and received a strong interest from the developer to develop the project;
- Applied for two grants that, if awarded, will fund the design and development phase of renovating the 1922 Warehouse building as an agricultural complex; and
- Developed a matrix of potential funding sources and met with the USDA/Rural Development on four separate grant categories than could be available for the project.

There are four recommendations in the report: 1) select the Florence Mill Redevelopment Area as the site for the Rutherford County Farmers Market and move the structure by the 2014 season, 2) move forward with the design and development concept for the 1922 Florence Mill Warehouse building, 3) complete the architectural and business plans and development agreements for the ***Agricultural Innovations and Solutions Center***, and 4) consider the inclusion of a full time staff person in the 2014-2015 Rutherford County budget to implement the agricultural economic development strategies outlined in this report.

If Rutherford County and the Town of Forest City elect to move forward on the project, the staff will bring the estimated cost for moving the Rutherford County Farmers Market to the Florence Mill site and a draft agreement to the January 2014 Board meetings. Work will also begin, pending funding from the two grants submitted, for the design and development phase of the ***Agricultural Innovations and Solutions Center***. This will include developing the ownership, management, and operational structure for the agricultural complex and the partnership agreements between the County, Town and private sector developer.

The Charlotte Regional Partnership (CRP) is the Grantee of Foreign Trade Zone #57. The U.S. Foreign Trade Zones Board is providing the option of applying for a new management plan for the FTZ program called "Alternative Site-Management Framework" or ASF. This letter is written to formally extend to Rutherford County the opportunity to join the service area of FTZ #57.

A fact sheet is enclosed that briefly explains the FTZ program and lists the potential advantages of the ASF over our current, traditional FTZ framework. The ASF option allows for an expansion of the current FTZ Service Area and will enable companies in any part of the newly-defined service area to gain access to FTZ benefits as they are needed. This program could enhance your county's ability to attract and expand companies involved in international trade.

Currently there are general-purpose FTZ #57 sites in Mecklenburg, Union & Catawba Counties and an FTZ #57 Subzone in Cabarrus County. The FTZ #57 Administrator, Laura Foor, has received the go-ahead from the CRP Board to pursue an application to the U.S. FTZ Board for the ASF option. You may wish to visit our website at [www.charlotteusa.com](http://www.charlotteusa.com) for additional information about FTZ #57, and the services of the CRP.

We are requesting an FTZ service area comprised of the seventeen (17) contiguous counties within 60 miles and/or 90 minutes driving time of the "outer limits" of the Port of Charlotte. FTZ #57 is under the U.S. Customs and Border Protection service based at Charlotte-Douglas International Airport; the legal description of the "outer limits" enabled the CRP to request that Customs approve the inclusion of Rutherford County in the ASF Application.

A letter of support from all contiguous counties is requested for the application. In order for Rutherford County to be included in the draft application as part of #FTZ 57's new service area,



the support letter must be received by December 6, 2013. A sample support letter is enclosed for your reference.

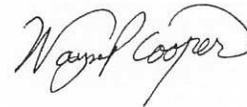
There will be an initial charge of \$2,500.00 to non-CRP-member counties to help cover the cost of the ASF application; this fee is due no later than February 15, 2014. After approval of the ASF, a fee of \$1,000 will be assessed annually to provide for the marketing and operations of FTZ #57 by the CRP on behalf of Rutherford County. This fee will be due annually on February 15<sup>th</sup>, beginning in 2015.

## FOREIGN TRADE ZONES – ALTERNATIVE SITE FRAMEWORK (ASF) FACTS, BACKGROUND & ADVANTAGES

### **FACTS: What is the “Alternative Site Framework?”**

Alternative Site Framework (ASF) is a recently implemented program, which offers greater flexibility to designate and manage general-purpose FTZ sites based on “user-driven” needs.

### **What are the differences between the Traditional vs. ASF**

Submission of traditional General Purpose Expansion or Sub-Zone application to the Foreign Trade Zone Board for action under the **Traditional Zone Framework** requires:

- Generally a ten (10) month process
- Greater documentation requirements
- Submission of a request for administrative minor boundary modifications involves swapping like properties from existing zone sites

### **Alternative Site Framework reorganization application for FTZ Board action requires:**

- Generally, six (6) to eight (8) months for ASF reorganization applications with no new Magnet Sites (industrial parks). USFTZ Board prefers no more than six magnet sites.
- Faster Processing for **Usage Driven Sites** once an ASF application is submitted, the Grantee can utilize the simplified and minor boundary modification actions for usage driven sites. This eliminates the need to “swap” like amounts of acreage from existing sites.

Does not affect existing **Subzones**

### **National Advantages and Status**

- In response to the benefits of the ASF program, thirty-five (35) zones in the U.S. have been approved for ASF status (as of the 2012 annual FTZ Board Report) and seventeen (17) more applications are in process. Zones approved for ASF in the Southeast U.S. include Piedmont Triad, Research Triangle, the Upstate of South Carolina, Port of Charleston, Northern Virginia and three in Georgia.
- The ASF approach is simpler through new, clearer regulatory provisions, flexibility in meeting the speed of business today and more predictability for zone administrators and users.
- Coupled with the president’s National Export Initiative (NEI) focus of the work of the US Export Assistance Center in Charlotte, there should be increased interest in the FTZ program as it mutually supports the trade goals by maximizing the potential for U.S. exporters and manufacturers.

### **Changes For FTZ #57:**

- Alternative Site Framework (ASF) allows application for an expanded “service area” – FTZ status may be available to (additional) counties, within the 60 mile/90 minute drive time from the outer limits of the Port of Charlotte, and the concurrence of U.S. Customs & Border Protection.
- ASF status provides the ability to locate and more readily gain FTZ status for multiple usage driven operations within the magnet site, or elsewhere in the service area.
- For existing General Purpose Zone (GPZ) sites or new Magnet sites, once designated ASF, there is a new 5-year Magnet site sunset provision and a 3-year Usage Driven site sunset provision; however, a “sunset” resets after any activation.
- GPZ sites may need to be designated as “Usage-Driven” if that is the more appropriate status.
- Assured access & timeliness of US FTZ Board response are a boost to advertising & recruitment of both warehousing & production operations.
- Increases the “international scope and services” of each site.
- Grantee is allowed to activate no more than 2,000 acres at any one time, without extraordinary justification. Note: 2000 acre activation limit has never been approached.

**Magnet Site** is the new terminology under ASF rather than the traditional general purpose zone: business or industrial parks and/or large warehousing operations for the purpose of recruiting and or serving multiple businesses with a wide range of FTZ services.

### **Magnet Site Owner & Operator Advantages:**

- Marketing assistance from CRP and counties in the service area about the FTZ program and for recruitment of users, including usage-driven operations within a magnet site.
- Enhanced marketing potential & help from the U.S. Export Assistance Center & SBA staff in Charlotte as well as members of the NC District Export Council (Wayne Cooper, chair and Pamela Davison, vice chair) & via the Charlotte World Trade Association.
- Significant reduction time from application to FTZ designation for sites in pre-approved areas.
- Assurance of FTZ status for any legitimate potential user.
- Expedited specific site (usage) designation within the Magnet site.
- Greater flexibility allowed under ASF:
  - More immediate response to a business needing FTZ benefit due the ability to gain approval for usage-driven operations anywhere within the service area.
  - After successful transition to ASF there is no longer a requirement of equal land swap when requesting a “minor modification” (MBM) of a zone. Since the Service Area (generally entire counties) has already been pre-approved by the FTZ Board through a public process. The MBM application simply denotes the actual site and acreage to be activated for usage

**Usage-Driven Sites** are company-specific & not transferrable. If an operator of a Usage-Driven site vacates the site for any reason, a new company cannot locate on the existing Usage-Driven site and begin FTZ use. A minor boundary modification is required for a fresh designation of the facility.

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#### **User & Usage-Driven Site Advantages & Protections**

- *Lowers participation barriers to small and medium sized businesses*
- Faster return on investment (up to three times)
- Expedited zone start-up
- Lower initial investment cost

#### **Production Authority**

- Formerly called manufacturing or processing authority.
- Required if an operation changes the tariff code of a product while it is in the FTZ.
- Under ASF this is a separate application that may be prepared simultaneously with the Usage-driven application or when a need arises for a tariff savings or another FTZ program advantage.
